

There were some Greeks in town who had come up to worship at the Feast. They approached Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee:


"Sir, we want to see Jesus. Can you help us?"





St. Patrick's Shamrock The Christian idea of the divine Trinity — God's simultaneous threeness and oneness as Creator, Christ, and Holy Spirit — has always been a great challenge for preachers to grasp and explain. St. Patrick did it this way: he looked around, and then plucked a shamrock from the ground at his feet. Three leaves, he said, and yet one stem, one life. Add to that the shamrock's vibrant shade of green, the color of growth and vitality — and while it's easy to imagine a more technical, lengthy explanation of the Trinity, it's hard to imagine a better one.
